The Ordnance Bomb **Warfighter Focus** Fight Tonight: Deployment READINESS A HUGE FOCUS FOR MARINES

Preparing Marines for the "Fight Tonight" is an essential role in combat readiness for the Marine Corps. This can and should be done in any job or unit in the Marine Corps.

General Support Maintenance Company, 1st Maintenance Battalion completed a field operation from 18-22 October, which consisted of deploying portable dynamometers.

It had been three years since this had been attempted and the last time it was done, the dynamometers were not operational. Article written by Cpl Jonathan Spangler

These "expeditionary" dynamometers are containerized stations that are used to run and test engines, transmissions, and other pieces of gear that go to Light Armored Vehicles (LAVs) and High Mobility Multi Wheeled Vehicles (HMMWVs).

Maj Joe Saenz, the CO for GSM Company, tasked the maintenance officer CWO3 Jon Humphreys, with first getting the C7038 expeditionary dynamometer, engine the C7039 expeditionary transmission dynamometer, and the C7072 Automotive Generator Starter Test Stand (AGRS) running, and then getting them to the field in order to test the "expeditionary" capability.

Roughly 17 Marines with various 21XX, 35XX, and 13XX MOSs that participated in this evolution and the Company took known-good and known-bad engines and transmission to run on the dynamometers, as the primary objective was to test the dynos' capabilities in an expeditionary

environment. Cpl Jonathan Spangler, an AAV Mechanic and the Dyno Section NCOIC for GSM, was charged with the logistics of this exercise which he did exceptionally well. He coordinated with outside units to source the MAC-50 for the onload/offload and strategic placement of the containers in a predetermined location that he had surveyed prior, to insure the location was level which reduced the possibility of problems during operation.

The first day consisted of setting up the dynos, ancillary equipment, and power sources. The engines and transmissions were run on the second and third days, with minor speedbumps along the way.

This was the first time a Detroit 6V53 LAV engine had been run on this Expeditionary Dynamometer so a test pattern was created in order to complete a test. The

MEMBER cwo2 Nick Spotlight Desimone III

Chief Warrant Officer 2 Nick Desimone enlisted in the Marine Corps from Hauppauge, NY in October 2007 and went to Boot Camp in Parris Island. After graduating boot camp as a meritorious PFC and completing MCT, he reported to MOS school in Aberdeen, MD to become a 2131/artillery mechanic.

Because the Corps saw that he was destined for greatness, after graduating in June 2008 his first assignment was to 3rd Battalion, 11th Marines in beautiful Twentynine Palms, CA. After only a couple months at 3/11, Private First Class Desimone was promoted to Lance Corporal in September however, since he preferred the respect that he witnessed NCOs receiving, he decided to earn a meritorious promotion to Corporal in December (less than 3 months later). Corporal Desimone deployed to OEF with 3/11 and later a deployment with the 31st MEU. In August 2011, he was again meritoriously promoted; this time to the rank of Sergeant. He finally left 3/11 after nearly 4 years, and headed to MCRD San Diego to mold the next generation of Marines as a Drill Instructor where he earned several accolades for his performance, including 3rd honor graduate from DI School, "most physically fit", and twice recognized as the Drill Instructor of the Quarter. After successful completion of this SDA, Sergeant Desimone reported in as the Maintenance Chief for 1st Battalion, 11th Marines in Camp Pendleton, CA. In October of 2017 he was promoted to Staff Sergeant and later reported to the Field Artillery School House in Ft Sill, OK before being selected the following year for the Warrant Officer Program.

While at WOBC-20, Desimone received orders to SOI West to be the Assistant Ordnance Officer however, after multiple calls from several Ordnance Officers across the globe, the Division Ordnance Officer routed a request to the Ordnance Officer of I-MEF to have WO Desimone's orders modified to 3rd Assault Amphibian Battalion (3D



AABn). After graduating TBS as the "Gung Ho" recipient, and completion of Ordnance Officer Course, he reported in to 3D AABn in the summer of 2020. Since then, Chief Warrant Officer 2 DeSimone has been instrumental in improving overall readiness and maintenance processes for 3D AABn. Serving not only as the Battalion Ordnance Officer, Chief Warrant Officer 2 DeSimone simultaneously filled the billet of Company B Maintenance Officer.

Chief Warrant Of-

ficer 2 DeSimone's actions while serving as Battalion Ordnance Officer supported initiatives external to the battalion. He supported Marine Corps Force Design 2030 by facilitating the successful inventory, inspection, and redistribution weapons, optics, and SL-3 to units throughout 1st Marine Division in order to better align Table of Equipment. His actions ensured a seamless divestment of Company D armory equipment, and enabled swift compliance to Marine Corps Force Design 2030. Throughout

the last year, Chief Warrant Officer 2 DeSimone also coordinated with multiple external agencies for concept design and implementation of equipment for the new 3D AABn maintenance/armory facility being built. His tireless efforts will ensure proper floor space, shelving, and accessories for weapons, optics, and SL-3 in 3D AABn's new armory facility once construction is complete next year.

In July of 2021 3D AABn was inspected by Field Supply Maintenance Analysis Office (FSMAO). In preparation for this inspection, Chief Warrant Officer 2 DeSimone worked tirelessly and often late into the night and his efforts resulted in 3D AABn Armory passing the FSMAO inspection with zero findings. This was an exceptional feat considering the divestment, fielding, and reorganization recently conducted by the unit.

The FSMAO inspection in July 2021 highlighted a severe maintenance leadership deficiency in Company B. Chief Warrant Officer 2 DeSimone was appointed Company B Maintenance Officer in August 2021. The billet of Company Maintenance Officer at 3D AABn is held by a 2110, Ordnance Vehicle Maintenance Officer. Chief Warrant Officer 2 DeSimone's Military Occupational Specialty (MOS) is 2120, Weapons Repair Officer. Despite his lack of experience with ordnance vehicle maintenance, Chief Warrant Officer 2 DeSimone simultaneously and successfully filled both billets of Battalion Ordnance Officer and Company B Maintenance Officer. His methodical approach to maintenance ensured correct readiness reporting which was evident with an initial drop in Company B readiness followed by a steady increase afterwards. Since Chief Warrant Officer 2 DeSimone assumed the billet of Company B Maintenance Officer, Company B has shown a steady increase in vehicle readiness as well as equipment accountability.

Chief Warrant Officer 2 DeSimone is an exceptional leader. He consistently produces results well above par, even when performing duties outside his MOS. His ability to supervise and manage ground ordnance maintenance operations are second to none, which is even more remarkable considering he was an arty mechanic and they're generally of below-average intelligence. Kidding aside, what he lacks in MOS knowledge he overcompensates with by his extreme professionalism, incredible work ethic and his unrelenting drive to set the best example for his Marines and for his family.

Upon checking in to the Division, Nick was asked what professional goals he had. His response was "to develop strong chiefs who embody the overall Marine concept", and to "pay it forward, continuing to seek out talent the way I was brought up" in the community. For the last year and a half, he has done exactly that and is a rising star in the community.

Nick and his wife JudyAnne have three children: Jovan, Romance, and Ana.

transmission dynamometer also successfully tested a MT653 LAV transmission.

The exercise, overall, was a huge success since this was the first time these dynos were deployed to a field exercise and actually executed their intended function of being "expeditionary".

Deployment readiness is a huge focus for Marines and completing this exercise gave the Marines confidence in their equipment which resulted in the Company and Battalion being more prepared for the fight tonight.

The success of this exercise, and the lessons learned, has the Marines of GSM itching to get back out to the field and continue sharpening their technical expertise, away from the comforts that reside in the garrison environment.
